### NATIONAL COLORECTAL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month reminds us that early detection is key.

According to the American Cancer Society, more than a million people in the United States count themselves as survivors. While early detection and treatments make a difference, there is more that can be done. Knowing the causes and risk factors help prevent colorectal cancer.

There are several risk factors we can control.

- **Diet** Studies show that diets rich in red and processed meats may contribute to colorectal cancer risks. Also, how we prepare our proteins may increase our risk, too. Grilling, frying and high-temperature cooking release chemicals that may contribute to colorectal cancer risks. Diets full of fruits, vegetables, and whole grains reduce our risk of colon cancer as well as other health risks.
- **Exercise** Sedentary lifestyles and obesity are two more risk factors for colorectal cancer. Once again, physical activity helps to reduce our risk factor for another disease.
- Smoking and heavy alcohol use Quit the one and limit the other. Ask your physician if you need help with either one.
- **Family history** While you can't control this, you can know it. Report it to your primary care physician so if your family history shows an increased risk for you, she can decide if you need early screening. Knowledge is power.

# Yards Gone Wild

We have had lots of rain and the grass is growing fast. Having a well manicured lawn is important to the health and safety of the community, it's not just about the yard looking nice.

### **FACTS AT A GLANCE**

Lawns that have grass and weeds over 10 inches tall are in violation of the tall grass and weed ordinance. Tall grass is an indicator that no one lives there and is therefore inviting crime and vandalism opportunities. Rats, snakes and other animals that cause health issues can live in tall grass. "Tall Grass & Weeds" is defined as grass, weeds, bushes, vines, poison ivy, poison oak or any other foreign growth, other than trees, ornamental shrubbery, flowers and garden vegetables. Tall weeds detract form the appearance of the neighborhood. Undesirable wildlife, like rats and mice use the un-mowed lawn for hiding places and habitat and these animals carry disease.

### **COULD THERE BE A REASON YOUR NEIGHBOR HASN'T MOWED?**

Neighbors don't always talk to other neighbors, but a little awareness of your neighbors situation may go a long way toward a positive sense of community and the appearance of your neighborhood could very well benefit.

### SHOW COMPASSION AND UNDERSTANDING

Neighbors where a serious family illness or physical limitations are reasons for lawn neglect. These neighbors may also have an inability to pay someone to mow and have no close family to help out. Think about the home where a spouse is on military assignment or where elderly neighbors cannot push a mower anymore. Look out for your neighbors and offer to mow their grass; arrange for other neighbors to take turns mowing too. Neighbors helping each other will maintain appearance and foster a positive sense of community.

## Beware of Social Security Phone Scams



Securing today and tomorrow

Telephone scammers are pretending to be government employees. They may threaten you and may demand immediate payment to avoid arrest or other legal action. Do not be fooled!

### If you receive a suspicious call:

- 1. HANG UP!
- 2. DO NOT GIVE THEM MONEY OR PERSONAL INFORMATION!
- 3. REPORT THE SCAM AT OIG.SSA.GOV

### What to look out for



The caller says there is a problem with your Social Security number or account.



Any call asking you to pay a fine or debt with retail gift cards, cash, wire transfers, or pre-paid debit cards.



Scammers pretend they're from Social Security or another government agency. Caller ID or documents sent by email may look official but they are not.

Callers threaten you with arrest or other legal action.

### Be Alert

Social Security may call you in some situations but will never:

- Threaten you
- Suspend your Social Security Number
- Demand immediate payment
- Require payment by cash, gift card, pre-paid debit card, or wire transfer

- FREE Tax Preparation Basic federal income tax returns prepared and e-filed by IRS certified volunteers.
- SAFE AND SECURE No hidden fees.

Assistance is provided from mid-January through April. You may locate a VITA site near you by calling 2-1-1 or visiting mymoneydfw.com. Some VITA Sites also offer... VITA on the Go - Allows individuals to drop off their tax information. Returns will be processed within three business days. MyFreeTaxes.com - An online tax preparation software to help identify tax credits and deductions. This service is available for income levels up to \$66,000.


