Thanksgiving COVID Guidelines



Thanksgiving is a time when many families travel long distances to celebrate together. Travel increases the chance of getting and spreading the virus that causes COVID-19. Staying home is the best way to protect yourself and others. If you must travel, be informed of the risks involved.

Celebrating virtually or with members of your own household poses the lowest risk for spread. In-person gatherings that bring together family members or friends from different households, pose varying levels of risk.

• The Following people should not attend in-person holiday gatherings.

People with or exposed to COVID-19

People at increased risk for severe illness

Considerations for Hosting or Attending a Gathering.

Check the COVID-19 infection rates, limit the number of attendees, host outdoors, have proper ventilation, social distance, wear masks, encourage guests to wash hands frequently, provide or encourage guests to bring hand sanitizer and masks, limit contact with commonly touched surfaces, clean and disinfect all surfaces and areas.

Food and Drinks at Small Family Gathering.

Encourage guests to bring their own food for their own household and avoid potluck serving.

Ensure safe and sanitary preparation and serving of food and cleaning of dishes afterward

Avoid crowding in areas where food is served.

Travel and Overnight Stays.

Wear a mask and be sure to social distance. Wash your hands as often as possible and avoid contact with anyone who is sick as well as your face mask, eyes, nose and mouth.

Consider whether you, someone you live with, or anyone you plan to visit with is at increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19 to determine whether to stay overnight in the same residence or to stay elsewhere.

If you are an overnight guest, wash and store your belongings, wear a mask whenever possible, and take precautions to wash your hands as frequently as possible.

If you are exposed to COVID-19 while traveling or at any time, quarantine yourself to protect others and follow all CDC guidelines,

for a fire-safe Thanksgiving.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), there are more than three times as many home cooking fires on Thanksgiving as a typical day of the year, making it by far the leading day for US home cooking fires. This sharp spike (a nearly 250 percent increase over the daily average) is a powerful reminder to use caution when cooking this year's Thanksgiving feast.

The City of River Oaks Fire Department would like to offer the following tips and recommendations for cooking safety this Thanksgiving.

- Make your cooking area safe. Move things that can burn away from the stove. Turn pot handles toward the back so that they can't be bumped.
- Watch what you're cooking. Use a timer when roasting a turkey or baking pies.
- Be prepared. Keep a large pan lid or baking sheet handy in case you need to smother a pan fire.
- Stay awake and alert while you're cooking. If you see smoke or the grease starts to boil in your pan, turn the burner off.
- Prevent burns. Wear short sleeves when you cook or roll them up. Don't lean over the burner. Use potholders and oven mitts to handle hot cookware.

A Note About Frying Turkeys

Deep-frying turkeys have become popular in recent years. This cooking method has a lot of risks. Turkey fryers get hot all over, so they need to be handled with great care and only by an adult. They can tip over, spilling hot cooking oil. Partially frozen turkeys placed into hot fryers will cause the oil to splatter. If fryers are overfilled, the hot oil can spill over the side when the turkey is added. Even a small amount of oil on a hot burner can start a fire. If you deep-fry a turkey, place the fryer outside on a flat surface that can't burn, such as cement. Place the fryer several feet from anything that can catch fire. Don't let children or pets come anywhere near it. An adult should watch the fryer while it cooks and use a fryer with thermostat controls. Without these controls, the oil can heat to the point of catching fire. Thaw the turkey completely before cooking it so that ice crystals won't splatter the hot oil. Use potholders and oven mitts when handling the turkey.

Large feasts require numerous appliances. Prevent electrical fires by not overloading your outlets.
